2015 Early School Leavers Survey

The Queensland government is conducting its annual statewide survey of students who left school in Years 10, 11 and prior to completing Year 12 during 2014. The Early School Leavers survey is a short, confidential survey that collects information about what your people are doing the year after leaving school. The information from the survey helps our schools to understand the pathways young people follow after leaving school and to plan services to support transitions into study or employment for our students. Between July and August, our students who left school in Years 10, 11 and prior to completing Year 12 last year can expect to receive an invitation to complete a web-based survey or a telephone call from the Qld Government Statistician's Office to complete the survey. Please encourage early school leavers to take part.

TRUANCY AND COMPULSORY SCHOOLING REQUIREMENTS



Parents, are you aware that the *Education (General Provisions) Act 2006* has an entire chapter dedicated to **your requirements** in relation to your children's attendance at school? Under this section, each parent of a child who is of compulsory school age **must** ensure their child is enrolled and attends a State School (or non-state school) on every school day. Unless there is a reasonable excuse, parents can be prosecuted and face fines starting from \$500. Due to the significant increase in student absences, Kingaroy Police will be out in force during Term 3 locating and identifying children who are out of the school's grounds during school hours without a valid pass out. These children will be transported back to school and their parents notified.

WORK EXPERIENCE

FROM THE CHAPLAIN

During the Holidays I spent a week as a coach at Teen Street Camp in Gatton. It was the 6th year running and with just under 500 people the campus was buzzing!

There were about 20 young people from Kingaroy who attended this camp. The theme from the week was *Free 2 Be*; with the number 2 representing two choices that we have, controlled or freed. We are often held back by things and feelings that keep us captive, for example fear, insecurities, shame, feeling worthless, doubt and failure. You may feel all of these or none of it, you may be held back by something completely different that is preventing you from entering into a space of freedom. On one of the days at this camp we had a look at thoughts and what happens inside our brain when we have a negative v positive thought. The negative thoughts show up in our brain like black trees that would grow as more negative thoughts were added, whereas positive thoughts showed up as light. We need to start seeing what our chains are that are holding us back and ask ourselves do we want black trees growing in our brain or do we want to be filled with light; do we want to be set free.

P & C NEWS

I hope everyone had an enjoyable break and welcome back to Semester Two. Our P&C Association will, in the next six months, go through its most significant transition period in the past 10 years. At the last P&C Meeting, Mr **Peter Mortimer** announced he will not be continuing with the massive role he has fulfilled in the operations of the South Burnett Mart Auction since it started. Peter's contribution to P&C cannot be adequately described, he is a founding member of the Mart Auction Sub-Committee and has handled all aspects of the financial dealings, he has provided ongoing financial advice and direction to P&C and he has pulled together the annual reports of the Auxiliary, Mart Auction and P&C for audit, and submission, to the Education Department. Peter's youngest son William graduated from Kingaroy SHS in 2006 and he has continued to serve for 9 years since that time. KSHS and the P&C owe Peter an incredible debt of thanks and gratitude for his diligence and service to our school family. Peter may well continue to pop into P&C meetings in 2016, but we now have 6 months to come up with a plan for his replacement.

Additionally, this will be my final year as President of KSHS, my youngest child Mitchell did not return to school this year but I felt it important that with David Ballin going into the Assistant Regional Director role and a new Principal joining the school that I should stay for an extra year to offer support and stability to the new leadership team of the High School. Over the past couple of years, my work role has changed significantly and I need to travel a great deal. Most weeks this means I am away from home 2 or 3 nights a week and I feel that because of this I have let P&C down by not being able to attend every school function as I once could. Louise Judge, our secretary will be also finishing at the end of the year as her youngest child, Dallas graduates from Year 12. Louise has been Secretary for 9 years and has worked very closely with Peter to do the day to day financial running of the Mart Auction and the point of contact for the Mart staff. I have always stressed that the Secretary and Treasurer have by far the largest roles in an Executive.

So as you can see, P&C has had a long period with minimal changes to Executive Members and other key people (Peter), and now the planning needs to start for a handover to the future, and that requires all parents to think about how they can help. In the next month we will call a working party meeting to discuss the future of the Mart Auction. We either need to come up with more volunteers, which despite repeated requests we have only had a few parents put up their hands, or we need to completely restructure it with all paid staff, which will significantly reduce profits or make it unviable to continue. When this meeting is called, I ask that as many parents as possible come along to the meeting and share your thoughts. As well as that, I encourage parents to start coming to P&C meetings so that you can see what happens and be involved. This next six months can be used to find new executive members who will be able to step into the role and support this great school by providing funding for major projects that benefit the education of students. Our next P&C meeting is July 28 at 7.30pm at the Community Building. All are welcome.

My thanks also to the P&C Auxiliary for their continued amazing work and their donation last month of \$20 000 to P&C.
